Organized public health services have been in all Ohio communities since the early 1900s. While much has changed in society since those days, the mission and function of your health department has not. We continue to recognize changing health needs and work to build environments that allow residents to prioritize health and well-being. Our service to the public spans more than 100 years, but I can assure you that this agency continues to evolve.

This report is a snapshot of services provided across all divisions of the agency in 2023.

I am particularly proud of the "what is new" section that demonstrates our efforts to maintain awareness of community needs and to use new ideas to get resources into the hands of residents. The Health Center was recognized at the federal level for enhancing access to medical care and reducing health disparities. And I am so proud of all the team members who are creating more user-friendly data sheets, building forms that industry can more easily submit, and reducing wait times for services across the board.

PREVENT



- Vaccines: Medina County Health Department (MCHD) staff held 57 immunization clinics in a variety of community settings: schools, businesses, long term care facilities, other government agencies, and community events.
- Overdose Prevention: Together with the Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health
 (ADAMH) Board, we continue to address the opioid crisis. We distributed 834 naloxone
 kits, a 27% increase from 2022. We placed 2 new NaloxBoxes in Medina and Lodi where
 residents can now easily pick up free naloxone. Overall, Medina County had 83 overdose
 reversals thanks to naloxone.
- Health Center: Served 3,273 total medical and/or dental patients with a total of 5,422 visits at our Medina and Wadsworth clinics. The Health Center treats the whole person by providing excellent comprehensive medical care, dental care, and social services. The Health Center received 2 awards in 2023 from the Health Resource and Services Administration; one for reducing health disparities and another for enhancing healthcare access.















PROMOTE



- Vaping and Tobacco: Health Department staff provided education to 1,900 students on the harms of using tobacco vaping products. Over 50 presentations were given to middle and high school students.
- Community Events: Agency staff attended over **35 community events**, reaching approximately **4,900 community residents**. Staff utilized these events to promote Health Department services, healthy behaviors, and helpful resources.
- Women, Infants, and Children (WIC): WIC continues to provide nutrition education counseling, breastfeeding education and support, and a supplemental nutritious food package. Our WIC program had **4,808 appointments** in 2023 with county residents.
- Farmers' Market: Nearly **200 coupon books** were distributed to WIC participants at this year's MCHD Farmers' Market. Coupons could be used to purchase local vegetables from local farmers.
- Youth Hygiene Kits: MCHD staff distributed **over 900 hygiene kits** to youth-serving organizations throughout Medina County. These kits included a variety of personal hygiene items for both teenage boys and girls.

PROTECT



- Mosquito Education: Our Environmental Health Division provided education on mosquito borne diseases and worked to prevent the spread of these diseases.
 - 15 mosquito trap locations throughout the county
 - 4,485 mosquitos trapped and submitted to Ohio Department of Health for testing
 - **348 miles** of road ditches treated to prevent spread of mosquitoes
 - 2,093 catch basins treated to prevent spread of mosquitoes
- Food Program Inspections: Agency food inspectors protect the public by inspecting
 restaurants and food establishments to make sure food is properly stored and prepared. A
 total of 2,445 food program inspections were done in 2023.
- Sewage Replacement Grant: MCHD was able to replace 9 failing sewage systems for Medina County residents.
- Car Seat Inspections: Agency staff provided **86 car seat inspections** revealing a **75% misuse rate** among seats inspected. Corrections were made and education provided to **121 total clients**.
- Newborn Home Visits: Agency nurses completed **52 newborn home visits**. These visits provide parents with an opportunity to ask questions, get breastfeeding support, and receive information on their baby's health, weight, development and safety.

WHAT ELSE IS NEW?

2023 was a year that allowed us to evolve and begin many other new initiatives to meet the needs of our community:

- Fentanyl test strips program
- New communication outlets with the launch of our Community Newsletter and Public Health Blog
- Food Safety Newsletter in both English and Spanish
- Revitalized outreach to long-term care facilities
- New staff positions to address community needs
- Improvements to our building making it easier for public access


