## *Naloxone: Offers hope to save lives and a chance at recovery*

Project DAWN is an overdose education and Naloxone distribution program. Participants learn how to:

- Recognize the signs and symptoms of an opioid overdose.
- Make an emergency 9-1-1 call.
- Perform rescue breathing safely.
- Administer Naloxon to someone experiencing an opioid overdose.

To receive a Naloxone kit at no charge:

- You must be 13 years or older.
- In-person training (Typically last 15 minutes)

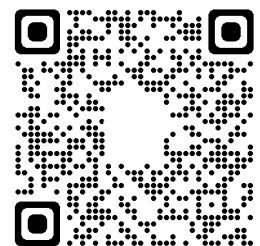

# **STOP OVERDOSES. CARRY NALOXONE.**

Naloxone can reverse  
an opiate overdose.

Call 911 in an emergency.

Opioid overdose is life-threatening and requires immediate emergency attention.  
Recognizing the signs of opioid overdose is essential to saving lives.

Call 911 immediately if a person exhibits any of these symptoms:

- Their face is extremely pale and/or feels clammy to the touch
- Their body goes limp
- Their fingernails or lips have a purple or blue color
- They start vomiting or making gurgling noises
- They cannot be awakened or are unable to speak
- Their breathing or heartbeat slows or stops

## **An overdose is a MEDICAL EMERGENCY! Call 9-1-1 immediately**

When you call 9-1-1 to save a friend or family member who is overdosing, you won't be arrested or punished for minor drug offenses under a new Ohio law.

Ohio's new Good Samaritan Law now permits people to get and carry overdose reversal medication, naloxone, also called by its brand name Narcan or Kloxxado.
